Sarah Milkovich focuses her practice in the areas of complex commercial litigation, criminal defense, regulatory compliance, and internal investigations. She has counseled clients through investigations and enforcement actions brought by the Securities and Exchange Commission, the U.S. Department of Justice, the Commodity Futures Trading Commission, and the National Futures Association. Sarah has also represented clients in a wide variety of litigation matters, including those involving RICO and fraud claims, mergers and acquisitions, securitization transactions, employment disputes, fiduciary duties, and shareholder derivative claims.

In another pro bono case, Sarah worked to secure the new DNA testing

that led to the exoneration of a man who had been wrongfully convicted on the basis of unreliable bitemark evidence and a false confession.
